

Etosha National Park

The Etosha National Park is one of Southern Africa's most spectacular wildlife reserves. Proclaimed in 2007, the park is also one of the oldest in Namibia and its size, conservation history and uniqueness justifies its title as the country's flagship conservation area. The massive mineral pan, covering an area of approximately 4 500 km², or about 20% of the surface of the Park, gave rise to the name Etosha – which means "Great White Place". The pan was originally a lake fed by the Kunene River, but with the change in river the course of the river, over thousands of years, the lake dried up and is now a large dusty depression that only temporarily fills or partially fills with water during the rainy season. During these times, the pan attracts pelicans and flamingos in impressive numbers, and a wide variety of other wading birds. The perennial spring along the edge of the Etosha Pan attract and sustain large concentrations of wildlife and birds.

Etosha is one of the largest savannah conservation areas in Africa, and is world renowned for its spectacular wildlife viewing. Visitors can expect to see elephant, lion, white and black rhinoceros, leopards, cheetah, large herds of springbok, wildebeest, zebra, giraffe and a multitude of other fascinating species, big and small, interacting in their natural environment.

The three classic camps inside Etosha are Okaukuejo, Halali and Namutoni. The two relative new camps that form part of the eco-collection are Onkoshi Camp, first opened in 2008; and Dolomite Camp – the first lodge inside western Etosha.

Visitors can experience the park through guided night drives, providing you with an opportunity to experience an entirely different side of Etosha's wildlife treasures. Morning and afternoon guided drives are also on offer. All guided drives are conducted in specially modified land rovers, using experienced guides who will help you discover the wonders of nature, both big and small.



Onkoshi Camp

Wild, immaculate and highly fashionable, Onkoshi Camp offers spectacular vistas over the Etosha Pan and an atmosphere of tranquillity

Namutoni Camp

Iconic, charming and historically different, Namutoni is a fortress set on the woodland ridges of the wildlife rich eastern part of Etosha

Halali Camp

Located halfway between Namutoni and Okaukuejo amongst shady Mopane trees, lies the tranquil Halali

Okaukuejo Camp

Aptly known as the "Wildlife Theatre" of Etosha, Okaukuejo boasts a permanent floodlit waterhole where a wide variety of wildlife congregates and interacts, in particular during the dry season

Dolomite Camp

Set on a tranquil dolomite hill in the virtually untouched western side of Etosha, Dolomite Camp is a scenic location. The Camp is a seasonal lure for botanists and photographers alike, with hundreds of seasonally blooming tree and shrub species
